

<u>Safeguard American Voter Eligibility Act ("SAVE Act") (H.R. 22)</u> <u>One Pager—North Carolina</u>

- The SAVE Act will prevent countless North Carolinians from voting or even registering to vote—North Carolinians would not be able to register to vote using their driver license or other North Carolina-provided identification unless it demonstrates American citizenship.
- The North Carolina driver license does not indicate American citizenship—nor does any state's standard license—and North Carolinians would therefore be unable to use their license alone to register to vote under the SAVE Act.
 - o The SAVE Act would potentially **disenfranchise more than two million women in North Carolina**.
 - The SAVE Act mandates that, if a registrant does not have a passport, they must present their photo identification alongside additional documentation, such as a birth certificate.
 - But an estimated 2,310,422 North Carolina women have a name that does not match their birth certificate, usually because they changed their name upon marriage. The SAVE Act would prevent many of these women from registering to vote or casting a ballot.
 - o Further, military voters would not be permitted to use their military ID alone when registering.
 - Instead, the SAVE Act requires North Carolina servicemembers to go through the trouble of obtaining their service record to present alongside their military ID, so long as the service record shows their place of birth was within the United States.
 - If the North Carolina servicemember's place of birth was not in the United States—perhaps because they were born abroad to military parents—the SAVE Act would bar them from using their military ID at all to register to vote.
 - o Additionally, the SAVE Act would disproportionately burden Native voters, including the many that live in North Carolina.
 - The SAVE Act requires that Americans registering to vote show a form of identification that demonstrates American citizenship, or that the applicant was born in the United States, but IDs issued by Tribal governments within North Carolina generally do not show place of birth or American citizenship.
- The SAVE Act would make North Carolinians' lives more expensive.
 - o Roughly **56.3 percent of North Carolinians** *do not* have passports—at a cost of \$130 per passport, the SAVE Act could force North Carolinians to pay over \$751 million just to register to vote.
- The SAVE Act would prevent North Carolinians from registering to vote by mail or online, requiring an applicant to present documentary proof of citizenship in person at an appropriate election official's office.
 - o This means that any servicemember deployed overseas will have to travel back to North Carolina and physically visit an election office to register to vote.
 - o This would also burden rural North Carolinians who live far from election offices.
- The SAVE Act would disenfranchise rural North Carolinians who often have limited access to governmental offices that would help them access documentary proof of citizenship—like passport services.
- The SAVE Act is a federal takeover of North Carolina's election administration that will make it harder for North Carolinians to exercise their right to vote.
- The SAVE Act would subject North Carolina election officials to hefty criminal fines and up to five years in federal prison for simple mistakes—even if the registrant is an eligible American citizen.
